PAST/RECENT EVENTS & ACTIVITIES


Members were excited to gather in person at the LP Wilson Center for fall programs, each well attended.

In September the WGC welcomed Dr. Charles Button a local Windsor resident and Professor of geography and sustainability at Central Connecticut State University (CCSU). His very



significant decreases in crop yields for apples, peaches, pears, tobacco, and corn throughout the State of Connecticut. His presentation clearly showed the effect of uncontrolled greenhouse gas emissions and increase in expected average annual temperatures.

In October Perennials for 10 Months of Blooms, was presented by Nancy Ballek Mackinnon, a partner at Ballek's Garden Center, a family farm since 1662, in East Haddam, Connecticut. She bought a large variety of perennials as part of her discussion. These were available to WGC members.

Ms. Mackinnon has an excellent knowledge of many different perennials and herbs. A day trip to Ballek's Garden Center would be a day well spent. In the past, Ballek's had a large exhibit at the

Connecticut Flower & Garden Show, which is worth a visit as they have many plants and garden curios for sale.



Our November meeting welcomed local food expert and Windsor historian Gordon Kenneson. His light hearted discussion on *Herbs and Foods that Flavor Thanksgiving* shared details of the first Thanksgiving's foods from historical findings and personal family history. The first governor of the Plymouth Colony, William Bradford, was an earlier ancestor of Gordon Kenneson.

The 2nd Fall Garden Mart netted \$739 including sales of gardening implements as well as a wide variety of plants. Houseplants in the fall have proven to be popular, in addition to perennials, herbs, and shrubs. Thanks to Dave Stender and his committee for organizing, and to the many WGC members who participated by donating plants or funds, providing tables or tents, and volunteering.

WGC's Diane Bernier has been working with the young students at Poquonock School for the last several years, she reports on a very busy year she reports:





"This year we were able to start our program with seed planting using the outdoor court yard space and wearing masks.

Our many activities were:

We had a beekeeper come to give us lessons on bees.

We also painted a raised bed and donated it to Millbrook Senior housing on Mack Street Windsor.

We were able to purchase a digital microscope to view insects up close.

We also had a zoom lesson on composting from Northwest Park and purchased a composter for the school. With our state grant money, we purchased compost, soil and new cages for the gardens. We planted our garden and the produce was wonderful this year.

Diane made sauce with the tomatoes and fresh pepper, onions and garlic to be frozen to be used at later date for hopefully a pizza party.

As in the past years each week students learned new things about gardening such as soil, seeds, invasives, insects and plant structure. We look forward to next year and hopefully we will be able to take a field trip to a CSA in our area."
